

FOREWORD

The Statistical Yearbook of Prague is a crucial publication of the Regional Office of the Czech Statistical Office. It has been bringing a complete statistical overview of all economic activities of the national economy derived from available data. It is published, similarly as in other regions, in already the fourteenth edition of continuous series, both in the electronic and printed version. These traditional publications present a structure-unified content and follow the national Statistical Yearbook of the Czech Republic, which is compiled at the headquarters of the Czech Statistical Office. Data on the region are basically published for the period 2011 – 2013 and for selected indicators also in a longer time series since 2000.

This year, when we commemorate the 95th anniversary of foundation of the Czechoslovak state statistics, regional yearbooks underwent minimal changes as for their contents and form. The Macroeconomic indicators chapter publishes for the first time results of a rather large revision of regional accounts, which follows a national accounts revision published in the beginning of October. The Elections chapter presents results of the election to the European Parliament in May and also elections to local councils and city parts and the election to one third of the Senate of the Parliament of the Czech Republic, all having take place in October 2014.

Other changes consist only in omitting of information from ad hoc surveys, indicators, which have lost their reason, and in adding new pieces of information reflecting processes of the economy transformation, harmonization of the Czech statistics with procedures, standards, and classifications used by Eurostat, and a wider use of administrative data sources. Published tables do not contain more detailed data. If readers are interested in such breakdowns, they can address directly the nearest Information Services Unit of the Czech Statistical Office. Besides information on regions, available data by district and by administrative district of municipalities with extended powers, selected data on towns, and several indicators on individual municipalities can be found there as well. The enclosed CD contains inter-regional comparisons. Methodological notes on individual chapters are summarised after the data section. References and links to data sources, which were used in the preparation of the regional statistical yearbook, are cited in the methodological notes.

The basic source for the data published is state statistical surveys. Besides data sources of the Czech Statistical Office, available data from areas administered by respective ministries were also used, especially from the Ministry of Labour and Social Affairs of the CR, Ministry of Finance of the CR, Ministry of the Interior of the CR, Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports of the CR, Ministry of Health of the CR, Institute of Health Information and Statistics of the Czech Republic, and the Ministry of Transport of the CR. A vast portion of the data published is kept in the regional databases of KROK (data on regions and districts) and MOS (statistics of towns and municipalities), and in long-term time series. The Public Database (VDB) is an important information source for users. It is accessible on the CZSO website and enables to view statistical data in pre-defined tables in the breakdown by subject matter, territory, and time in ever greater detail. The database includes, among others, results of the 2011 Population and Housing Census and allows users to compile tailor-made tables. The regional yearbook, of course, cannot contain all pieces of information collected and processed by the state statistics. More detailed data from respective sections of demographic, economic, and social development of the regions, administrative districts, city sections municipalities, or micro-regions are published in specialized products (Statistical Bulletin, publications on demographic matters, thematically focused analytical materials, etc.), which are available mainly in the electronic form on the Internet. Many other pieces of information can be found on the website of the CZSO Regional Office (www.praha.czso.cz), not merely the latest updates of results of statistical surveys, but also information on the CZSO activities. On the website, you can also find an analysis Basic tendencies of demographic, social, and economic development of Prague in 2013 (Czech only) issued in the end of August 2014 and other analytical and data documents.

The sense of obtaining and processing of statistical data is to acquire knowledge, seek for trends in the development, but, first of all, to meet the requirements of the society for statistics, i.e. the data utilisation in practice. Long-term experience with the users' interest in information in regional breakdown, which has been constantly growing recently, make us believe that the regional statistical yearbook will continue to be a sought-after source of information both for professionals and lay readers. Like in the previous years, we will welcome your potential suggestions and comments on the yearbook's content. We hereby thank you for all remarks very much. They are very helpful to our work on the yearbook and will be a valuable contribution to the preparation of regional publications in 2015.

We express our thanks to all authors and colleagues for the effort and time they devoted to the preparation of the content as well as technical matters of this publication.
